



COMBATING THE IMPACTS OF ILLEGAL IMMIGRATION IN NEW JERSEY

INTERNATIONAL WIRE TRANSFER FEES WILL FINANCIALLY TARGET ILLEGAL ALIENS AND FUND LAW ENFORCEMENT

Illegal alien and narcotic trafficking networks often exploit wire transfer services to move money abroad, taking advantage of their less stringent oversight compared to banks. New Jersey could counter this by implementing a fee on international wire transfers. This approach would generate revenue without increasing taxes while also deterring illegal activities. Legal residents who make international wire transfers can reclaim the fee through tax credits when they file their annual tax returns. The state could use the additional funds to address the unfunded costs related to illegal immigration and enhance law enforcement efforts.

- According to a study by the [Federation for American Immigration Reform](#) (FAIR), illegal aliens and their children cost New Jersey \$5.3 billion in 2023, with each illegal alien costing the state \$5,625.
- Another study by [FAIR](#) concludes that New Jersey is supporting illegal aliens by allocating \$2.14 billion for education, \$780 million for police and corrections, and \$2.4 billion for healthcare and other general services.
- New Jersey had [1,720](#) known human trafficking victims between 2019 and 2023.
- In [2022](#), New Jersey had 28.1 opioid-related deaths per 100,000 people.
- In [2022](#), New Jersey had an illegal alien population of 475,000.
- According to [Rice University](#), Mexico saw nearly \$60 billion enter its country via remittances in 2022.

It deters illegal immigration and trafficking networks. Imposing a fee on outgoing international wire transfers makes it less desirable for illegal aliens or smuggling and trafficking networks to remain in the state. This added cost imposed on unlawful conduct could disincentivize these enterprises from operating in the state.

It could fund law enforcement. Law enforcement is often outmatched by well-funded cartels. The funds generated by this fee can be earmarked to enhance law enforcement efforts against smugglers and traffickers and keep communities safe.

It recoups untaxed income. In many instances, the wages illegal aliens receive working unlawfully in the country are untaxed income, which financially harms states. This fee partially recoups some of the lost state revenue caused by illegal immigration in the state.

Alabama should adopt a fee on international wire transfers to protect its citizens and economy!
