

Fatherhood is foundational to strong families, and strong families are essential to a strong Nation. An absent father affects all aspects of a child's life, including socio-cognitive development, socio-emotional development, academic performance, and criminality. Unfortunately, the effects of fatherlessness are far too visible throughout America, including in Georgia.

## THE PREVALENCE OF FATHERLESSNESS IN THE U.S. AND GEORGIA

- According to 2023 census data, approximately 18 million <u>children in the</u> <u>U.S.</u> live without a biological father, stepfather, or adoptive father present in the home.
  - Nearly <u>1 in 3</u> children in the United States is raised by a single parent, which is the highest rate of single-parent homes in the <u>world</u>.
  - Nationally, more than <u>80%</u> of children in single-parent homes live with their mothers.
- Fatherlessness is all too common in Georgia, too.
  - o **39%** of children in Georgia are living in <u>single-parent homes.</u>
  - 10,504 <u>children reside in foster care</u> in Georgia living with neither parent.

## FATHERLESSNESS AND EDUCATION

- Research shows that a father's involvement in their child's schooling results in higher grades and a lower likelihood of students repeating a grade.
- When children have an actively involved father, they are <u>33% less likely to</u> <u>drop out of school and 43%</u> more likely to get A's.

## FATHERLESSNESS, POVERTY, AND GOVERNMENT DEPENDENCE

- Children without fathers at home are <u>4x more likely</u> to live in poverty.
  - Approximately 411,000 <u>children live in poverty</u>—17% of all children in the state.
  - o 711,000 children are in families receiving public assistance in Georgia.
